Provincial Coordinator's Comments

On October 17, 2018 the federal government made legal the use of recreational cannabis and as a result many questions have surfaced in relation to worker and workplace health and safety. I sit here in appreciation for the amount of dialogue that it has created. The number of concerns that have been voiced by many organizations show how important worker and workplace health and safety is to Ontario's construction industry.

Although our attention is focused on recreational cannabis due to its legalization, it is only one of many items that can result in the impairment of a worker. Medicinal cannabis, alcohol, prescription drugs are only a few items that can have the same impairment impact on a worker and in some cases more of an effect. We all would be naïve to believe that the use of recreational cannabis hasn't made its way onto construction projects before. It is my opinion that this legalization does not pose a new hazard.

What this new legalization should do is make you focus on what your organization is doing to protect against worker impairment by any narcotics or alcohol. Your workers, under the Occupational Health and Safety Act, are obligated to "use or operate any equipment, machine, device or thing or work in a manner that may endanger himself, herself or any other worker". The introduction of recreational cannabis does not change that responsibility it only emphasizes it.

The use of recreational cannabis falls under the scope of The Smoke-Free Ontario Act. This Act does not allow any smoking of any kind in an enclosed workplace. We all understand that construction projects are at times fluid and may not have any enclosures to speak of and therefore this Act would not apply. Many constructors have put into effect no smoking (cannabis included) policies on their projects regardless of it being enclosed or not which goes towards ensuring compliance to the existing employer and supervisor duties under the Act to take every precaution reasonable in the circumstances for the protection of a worker.

In addition, the construction industry is aware that the Occupational Health and Safety Act and its prescribed regulations are the minimum standard and that any constructor or employer can enforce more stringent rules or policies at their workplaces. Many organizations have already developed "Fit for Duty" policies and have made the appropriate amendments to those policies to include the possible impairment from recreational cannabis. Some projects have even put in place measures to discourage even the

presence of cannabis at the project regardless if it is being consumed or not.

If your organization believes that the legalization of recreational cannabis will pose a hazard to your workers at your workplace or project, then I ask you...what do you have in place to address the hazard? It would be irresponsible to think that the MOL will be your means of assurance that your workers are not impaired. I suggest that networking amongst various associations and committees can assist with providing insight on what other organizations are doing to minimize the risk of impairment.

Court Bulletin 1

Bradford Company and Owner Fined Total of \$110,000 for Worker Fall

October 18, 2018 5:45 P.M. Ministry of Labour

Convicted: GMJ Electric Inc., an electrical contracting company, and supervisor, Gino Martignago, Bradford, Ontario.

Location: 27 Fasken Drive in Toronto, where a new office building was being constructed and an existing building was being renovated.

Description of Offence: A worker fell from a ladder and suffered permanent injuries while performing electrical wiring work.

Date of Offence: May 10, 2016.

Date of Conviction: Reasons for judgment released August 23, 2018; sentencing October 16, 2018.

Penalty Imposed:

- Following a trial, the company was fined \$100,000 and a supervisor was fined \$10,000 by Justice of the Peace Mark H. Conacher in Toronto court; Crown Counsel Indira Stewart.
- The court also imposed a 25-per-cent victim fine surcharge as required by the *Provincial Offences Act*. The surcharge is credited to a special provincial government fund to assist victims of crime.

Background:

- GMJ Electric Inc. was contracted by Santoro Construction Ltd. to carry out all electrical installations for the project. The injured worker was employed by GMJ Electric.
- Two workers were tying and labelling electrical wiring in the ceiling of a renovated office area.
 One worker was working from a 10-foot stepladder and reaching into an area above the grid of a dropped ceiling. The worker fell from the ladder to the floor, suffering permanent injuries.
- GMJ Electric was convicted of failing, as an employer, to provide information, instruction and supervision to a worker to protect the health or safety of the worker, contrary to section 25(2)(a) of the *Occupational Health and Safety Act*.
- GMJ Electric was further convicted of failing to ensure the measures and procedures prescribed by section 125(1) of the *Construction Projects Regulation (Ontario Regulation 213/91)* were carried out a project, contrary to section 25(1)(c) of the *Occupational Health and Safety Act.* Specifically, this involved failing to ensure that a scaffold was provided for a worker. A supervisor was also convicted of failing to ensure that a worker works in the manner and with the protective devices, measures and procedures prescribed by section 125(1) of the *Construction Projects Regulation* contrary to section 27(1)(a) of the *Occupational Health and Safety Act.*
- Santoro Construction Inc. was previously convicted of failing, as a constructor, to ensure the
 measures and procedures prescribed by section 125(1) of the Construction Projects
 Regulation were carried out at a construction project. That company was fined \$90,000 in
 Toronto court on April 3, 2018.

Court Bulletin 2

Worker Fatality Results in \$325,000 Fine for Company

October 17, 2018 5:50 P.M. Ministry of Labour

Convicted: Coco Paving Inc., 949 Wilson Avenue, Toronto, Ontario, a heavy civil construction company.

Location: A road reconstruction project on Highway 7 near Sciberras Road in Markham, Ontario.

Description of Offence: A worker was killed when steel casing rolled while being moved by a forklift.

Date of Offence: November 2, 2015.

Date of Conviction: September 28, 2018; Sentencing: October 15, 2018.

Penalty Imposed:

- Following a trial, the company was fined \$325,000 in Newmarket court by Justice of the Peace Philip N. Solomon; Crown Counsel Daniel Kleiman.
- The court also imposed a 25-per-cent victim fine surcharge as required by the *Provincial Offences Act*. The surcharge is credited to a special provincial government fund to assist victims of crime.

Background:

- Coco Paving Inc. was upgrading water mains buried under Highway 7. The work was part of a larger road-widening project.
- A worker was working alone welding two sections of steel casing on the north shoulder of Highway 7. The total length of the two sections was about 50 feet and weighed about 5,400 pounds.
- A wheel loader with forks attached (a forklift) approached the steel casing to lift and rotate the casing to complete the weld.
- The steel casing suddenly became dislodged from its wooden support and started to roll into a six-foot disch
- The casing rolled onto the worker, who became pinned in the ditch under the casing.
- The worker later succumbed to the injuries.

Court Bulletin 3

Fatal Fall Results in \$150,000 Fine for Windsor Company

October 16, 2018 4:30 P.M. Ministry of Labour

Convicted: Vollmer Inc., 3822 Sandwich Street, a multi-trade construction contractor located in Windsor.

Location of Workplace: A commercial/industrial building on Kew Drive in Windsor.

Description of Offence: A worker was killed after falling through a skylight in a building that was having new electrical equipment installed.

Date of Offence: November 3, 2016.

Date of Conviction: October 12, 2018.

Penalty Imposed:

- Following a guilty plea, Vollmer Inc. was fined \$150,000 by Justice of the Peace Susan Hoffman; Crown Counsel David McCaskill.
- The court also imposed a 25-per-cent victim fine surcharge as required by the *Provincial Offences Act*. The surcharge is credited to a special provincial government fund to assist victims of crime.

Background:

- Vollmer Inc. was working on a project that involved installing new electrical equipment and cable for new machinery being set up in a Windsor plant.
- A worker, along with a crew, was engaged in pulling lengths of heavy electrical cable onto the roof of the plant. During a break, the worker was observed in an area of the roof; the crew heard a crash, saw a shattered skylight and the worker on the concrete floor directly below.
- The fallen worker was taken to hospital and pronounced deceased.
- Although the skylights still had all of their covers on them, there were no guardrails, protective coverings or other means of fall protection installed or implemented to protect workers from the danger of failing through the skylights on the roof of the project.
- The Construction Projects Regulation (Ontario Regulation 213/91) requires that workers use and be trained in the use of a fall protection system when working at heights (Section 26.2(1.1).
